

Assessment of Progress Toward Achieving the Vision

Each bullet point below represents indicators that the Vision is being achieved, as established in the 2008-2014 Strategic Plan. Examples are provided after each bullet that illustrate achievement or movement toward achieving of the indicator:

- The number of discovery-based initiatives with clinical, scientific and/or economic impact has increased.
 1. *US patents filed in have increased from 2 in 2008 to 29 in 2010.*
 2. *In 2010, three experimental drugs discovered by faculty entered Phase I clinical trials.*
- Our faculty, staff, students and alumni are engaged across colleges, healthcare systems, industrial partners and professional associations to address healthcare needs.
 1. *Began a new collaboration with the Veterans Administration to provide training for staff in VA Medical Centers focused patient safety.*
 2. *Since 2008, launched six new collaborative research projects focused on medication safety.*
 3. *In 2011, launched three new community residencies in collaboration with Fagen Pharmacies, Kroger, and Walgreens.*
 4. *In 2011, launched RX-SafeNet, a community pharmacy-based research network.*
- Faculty, staff, students and alumni pursue and achieve positions of leadership that impact education, research, policy, and delivery of care related to human health.

- The education of students incorporates knowledge of cultural differences in healthcare delivery and effectiveness.

This begins with a special session in PHPR1000 in the pre-professional program, includes a special session in the orientation for the professional program and includes active exercises in several courses in the curriculum.

- We are providing access for a diverse student population that fosters a culture of inclusiveness and success.
The initiation of the Urban Leaders Scholarship program and the ExplorePurdue on campus experience were specifically to enhance the successful recruitment of students from underrepresented populations. Students who participate in the College's Multicultural Program have a graduation success rate that exceeds that of underrepresented students in enrolled in the University overall.
- Purdue is a global model for leading enhancements in human health.
The Purdue Pharmacy Kenya Program has received two national awards. We have launched the first pharmacy residency in global health and are the only program with faculty sited fulltime in another country.
- Our graduates are proactively recruited by leading employers.
Our Career Fair each November attracts between 35 and 70 employers each year.
- There is an increase in the number of students entering advanced professional training and/or post-graduate education.
Thirty-five percent of the 2011 graduating class pursued postgraduate training, compared with twenty percent in 2008.
- Medication safety and practice are enhanced as a result of our collaborative efforts with other professionals to develop and manage systems.
 1. *The Center for Medication Safety Advancement (CMSA) worked with several Indiana communities to enhance the implementation of e-prescribing. This work resulted in the receipt of the Safe-Rx Award in 2010.*
 2. *The CMSA worked with regional hospitals to adopt standardized concentrations for intravenous solutions of high risk medications.*
 3. *We developed a resource tool for practitioners managing oral anticoagulation therapy.*
- The number of new synergies (partnerships, collaborations and strategic alliances at the local, regional, national and global levels) has increased.
New partnerships created since 2008 include:
 1. *New residencies with Fagen Pharmacies, Kroger and Walgreens have been launched in 2011.*
 2. *Partnership with our Center for Medication Safety and the Veterans Health Administration for patient safety education*
 3. *Partnership with Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Clinical Practice to incorporate training for pharmacists into their Clinical Microsystems curriculum.*
 4. *Development of a statewide network of community pharmacists (Rx-SafeNet) to provide a research collaborative in a community setting. This has also become part of the outreach program for the Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute.*
